1.4.2 Analysis of Feedback

1) Alumni Feedback on Current Syllabi

The Punyashlik Ahilyadevi Holkar Solapur University, Solapur changed the syllabi of all programs in the academic year 2018-19. Therefore, in 2019, the College has decided to take feedback on the current syllabi from the alumni. The sample size for the feedback was 10. The data was collected with the help of a structured questionnaire.

The responses received from the respondents are presented in Table No 1.

More than 80 per cent of the respondents agreed that the current syllabi fulfilled their needs, it they gave them a clear idea about the purpose of the course, and the syllabi also fulfilled their objectives after the completion of the course. They also felt that the contents of the syllabi had developed a sustained interest in them, agreed about the explicit nature of the assessment strategies in the curriculum, and also found that the curriculum was useful at workplace. They felt it was pleasantly challenging, and they had easy access to prescribed/reference books. Whereas 80 per cent respondents opined that the curriculum load was optimum without putting any undue pressure on them.

<u>Analysis</u> <u>2) Teachers' Feedback on the Current Syllabus</u>

As the Solapur University Solapur changed the syllabi in the academic year 2018-19, the College has decided to take the opinion of the faculty after the change in the syllabi. A number of teachers from various departments had contributed in the syllabi restructuring process. There were 19 teachers working in the year 2018-2019 in grantable and non-grantable sections. The feedback was taken from 17 teachers out 19 of working in the College. So the sample size for the feedback was 19. The data were collected with the help of a structured questionnaire.

The responses received from the respondents are presented in the following Table No 2.

More than 75 per cent of the respondents opined that objectives of the syllabi were appropriate and explained clearly, it accurately described the course, and the work required for the course was sufficient. They also expressed the **opinion** that the tasks in the curriculum enabled analysis and solving of problems. They also stated that the syllabi offered research possibilities, entailed reference work, included useful textbooks, the time allotted to complete the syllabi was sufficient, and the amount of material for the course was reasonable. Fourty (40) per cent of the respondents agreed that the course offered room for community projects. More than 65 per cent respondents however mentioned that they had not played any role in the designing the syllabi.

<u>Analysis</u> <u>3) Parents' Feedback on Current Curriculum</u>

The Solapur University Solapur, changed the syllabi in the academic year 2018-19. In the year 2019, the College decided to take a feedback on the current syllabi from the parents. The College has decided to choose 10 parents. The sample size for the feedback was 10. The data were collected with the help of a structured questionnaire.

The responses received from the respondents are presented in the following Table No 3.

More than 80 per cent of the respondents positively responded that the curriculum took their ward's academic and professional needs into account, syllabi contained a statement of objectives, they could understand the objectives in terms of their learning outcomes, the contents of the syllabi matched the child's academic interest/aptitude, the curriculum would provide job opportunities to the wards, the syllabus encouraged **their wards** to go beyond it and consult people/other resources. About 70 per cent of the respondents felt that there was a need to revise the syllabus However, more than 30 per cent of the respondents complained about some aspects of the syllabi and also they found that the topics in the syllabi were too limited/vast.

The respondents were also asked about how often they had discussed the relevance of the syllabi with teachers to which about 20 per cent responded by saying that they rarely discussed the relevance with teachers whereas 10 per cent never discussed it with their teachers.

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<u>Analysis</u> <u>4) Students Feedback on Current Curriculum</u>

The Solapur university Solapur, changed the syllabus in the academic year 2018-19. Therefore, in the year 2019, the College decided to take students' feedback on the current syllabi. The College decided to choose 50 students. The sample size for the feedback was 50. The data were collected with the help of a structured questionnaire.

The responses received from the respondents are presented in the following Table No 6.

More than 92 per cent of the respondents opined that the present syllabi fulfilled their learning needs, course objectives were clear to them, course contents met with their expectations, contents were illustrated with adequate examples, course exposed them to new knowledge and practices, the course content had contemporary relevance, course seemed useful to them in getting a job, the structure of the syllabus was systematic, and that the topics included were of equal importance.

While answering the question regarding the adequacy of the level of the course, about 42 per cent agreed that it was adequate, whereas 24 per cent felt that it was too low and 34 per cent felt it was too high.
